Go Your Way

"Then I said, 'O my lord, what shall be the outcome of these things?' He said, 'Go your way, Daniel ...'" Daniel 12:8b-9 (ESV)

Whenever I'm driving somewhere new, I use the GPS on my phone. I enter the address and let it tell me where to turn. Whenever I'm driving with my husband, however, he likes to complicate my system.

He'll ask questions like, "Is this place near a landmark? What highways are we taking?"

My answer is always, "I don't know. I just do what my phone tells me."

Now, my husband's approach is probably better. It makes sense to know where you're going. What if the phone is wrong? (It never is.) What if there's an accident on the route? (The phone reroutes you automatically.) Or what if your phone runs out of battery because the kids stole the charger cord from the car? (More likely.) There is comfort and security in knowing the big picture.

In the book of Daniel, God showed Daniel a very detailed — and scary — picture of end-times events. Daniel foresaw violence, terror, and destruction, the likes of which the world has never seen (Daniel 12:1). The images didn't make much sense to him, and he struggled to put them into context.

Daniel was figuratively carrying the weight of the world, feeling the magnitude of the information, he now held. Naturally, he wanted to know how it all

would resolve. He wanted to know the big picture. He asked the angels around him:

"O my lord, what shall be the outcome of these things?' He said, 'Go your way, Daniel ..." (Daniel 12:8b-9).

Interestingly, this doesn't just mean physically "go your way." It also means mentally. It's almost like the angel said, "Rest in the assurance that God is in control and live your life. Follow God's lead as you take the next turn. And then take the next turn after that. Release your need to know the big picture and ask Him to direct you step by step."

While the stresses in my life are certainly less concerning than the end times, I'm still worried about the outcomes. Will we have to relocate after this next job change? Are these symptoms just signs of aging, or am I sick? Will my kids turn out, OK?

But for Daniel and for us, God's guidance is reliable. One day, after following each individual direction to turn this way, then that way, we will arrive at our destination. We will see the big picture God created for His people and His path especially for us.

In time, you will look back in awe as you celebrate the divine architect of your story. But perhaps what you will most cherish is the path that led you there. A path lined with obedience and faith and intimacy as you trusted Him with every move.

Go your way, my friend.


We had scheduled a bonfire in July, and while it unfortunately got rained out, we were glad for the rain.

We have also received <u>four new (to us) Max</u> <u>Lucado books</u> – to be placed on the north shelf by the window with the rest of Max's book:



A Tale of Two Conferences

Earlier this summer there were two conferences which had connections to Shepherd's Heart Fellowship. Both conferences were held in North Carolina. The first one was an interdenominational conference and the second one was a denominational conference.

The first one was a Child Evangelism Fellowship International Conference attended by over 1200 CEF missionaries from over 100 nations! Some of you may recall that our local Saturday Vacation Bible School outreach this summer was accomplished with the cooperation of local CEF staff leadership that even included teenagers presenting the program to younger children. In an earlier newsletter article this year I shared that Child Evangelism Fellowship was originally founded by a former Church of the Brethren minister, J. Irvin Overholtzer, in California. He was born on July 20, 1877 and started CEF to reach children with the Gospel of Christ when he was 60 years old.

At the opening ceremony of the conference each nation had a representative carry its national flag across a stage. Currently CEF is active in 201 out of 211 countries. Last year CEF shared the Gospel with over 30 million children. The conference had testimonials from different leaders from various countries. The conference attendees heard about the incredible work that God is doing especially in the Middle East and Africa.

This CEF international conference set a primary goal of reaching 100 million children with the Gospel by 2032. The second conference referenced in this article that was held this summer was the Church of the Brethren Annual Conference in Greensboro, NC in early July. Jeff Tuholski was our delegate this year and has shared and is available to share other details about this conference. His report is posted at the end of this newsletter edition. From our Annual Conference website I have been able to glean some of the following information.

The 2025 Annual Conference renewed the agency status of Bethany Seminary, Eder Financial, and On Earth Peace. One Query in regards to human sexuality was referred to the Review and Evaluation Committee. Another Query concerning human sexuality was adopted by the conference that quoted selective portions of the 1983 Annual Conference Paper called Human Sexuality form a Christian

perspective. Recommendations were adopted in regards to the calling of future denominational leadership. Recommendations were adopted from the Breaking Down Barriers committee to encourage Annual Conference participation that included the consideration of two new options for Annual Conference. One option would be for a biennial conference, and the other option would include alternate years of an in-person and online Conference, with the fully online year for business only and the in-person year for other Conference functions. The final report of the Standing With People of Color was shared. A cost of living adjustment for pastors' salaries was also adopted.

1,342 individuals registered for Annual Conference this year including 409 delegates and 933 non-delegates, 52 of which were virtual. Three new Church of the Fellowships were welcomed from CA, NC, and VA. Pastor Dennis Beckner of the Columbia City Church of the Brethren was chosen to be Annual Conference Moderator-Elect. He will become the Annual Conference Moderator in 2027. The 2026 Church of the Annual Conference will be held in Ft. Wayne, Indiana from June 28-July 2. I hope that many individuals from Shepherd's Heart Fellowship will plan to attend this 2026 Annual Conference.

Look at the Birds by Jenn Adams

Stepping out of the house on mid-August, Indiana Summer mornings, we never know if we'll hit a cool, clear breeze, or a heavy bag of thick, unbreathable cloud. I typically begin my days walking outside to water my flowers and twist on a couple sprinklers so our lawn doesn't turn into brown, dusty, straw. The activity keeps me away from my phone and computer for a little while longer, and gives me a better chance to connect with the Lord before beginning the hustle and bustle of the day. But it has been a *hot* Summer, a *humid* Summer – several weeks and recent days of degrees in the 90s. My plants have been suffering

from my lack of motivation to step out on these mornings, and they are drooped and withered. This day was another one of those thick, humid days – the kind where the first words out of your mouth after opening the door are, "EGH, BLEH." It's only been a week, but day after day of neglect has dried everything out. The grass is

the same – brown, thirsty. I don't want to step another foot out the door, but I must. It's time.

I turn on the hose and first water my starving plants – it will be a miracle if half of them come back to life at this point. I reattach the wave-form sprinkler head and trek to the left side of the backyard and see my other planted garden which I don't usually even bother to water since it rains. But rains have been infrequent, so I hold the sprinkler to give this patch of dirt a drink before setting it down to do the rest of its duty. Then something wonderful happens.

As I hold the streams against the house and two rows of decaying flowers, a robin hops down from the tree beside me and peeps his head from side to side. He is unusually close. As I steady the flowing sprinkler, Robin hops a little closer to the outer droplets. It takes me a few seconds to realize he wants a bath. He heard the water, I think to myself, it's been hot for you, too. I jerk my wrist a little so more drops hit his head and back, and he gives a little satisfied shiver to move the water between his feathers. I take one step toward him and he flies back into the tree again, but not far.

This encounter makes me smile. I finish my attention on the garden, then place the sprinkler over the brownest grass. I mosey to the front yard, doing the same with the other hose. Tasks completed, I have to leave the house for an errand, but when I return, twenty minutes later, I am blessed once more.

A dozen birds – robins, finches, all shapes and sizes, are bathing beneath the sprinkler in the side yard. They are bristling, hopping, stretching for the waterfall trickling off the tree leaves. One is low to the ground, spreading his wings to get all that cool, fresh water between every feather. If I was happy for my

Robin friend before, I am *full* of joy to see this provision laid out for these birds at this moment.

My mind reels with the thought that I almost didn't set foot outside today. I almost restricted this blessing; I almost denied the much-needed relief for these creatures – and God didn't let me. He brought me to the moment to share it with them,

and then brought me right back to it to witness what He had in mind for these birds. There were so many reasons I might not have ever seen this. I was humbled, blessed, excited. This whole morning honored me to be in small partnership with God in what He promised the birds.

And I was reminded Matthew 6:26 -

"Look at the birds. They don't plant or harvest or store food in barns, for your heavenly Father feeds them. And aren't you far more valuable to Him than they are?" (NLT)

Today the birds were given just what they needed, when they needed it. And God invited *me* to be a part of His deeper work in their life.

We must not let setbacks and inconveniences block us from our responsibilities to, for, and with God. We will miss what He has in store! Step out on a humid day, volunteer, approach a stranger, get uncomfortable. If He is doing this for the birds – how much more will He do for us?

This individual would participate hands-on, working alongside me over time, and would be prepared to assist as needed, help with any software upgrades, and be comfortable with basic Excel, Word, and general computer use. Church of the Brethren Annual Conference Shepherd's Heart Fellowship Delegate Report

This is my official report from the 2025 Church of the Brethren annual conference as your delegate.

In an earlier email, I sent out a list of the business items which also included the recommendations of the Standing Committee. I also included links to the annual conference website where you could view the entire set of business items in detail. If you would like to see any of this in hard copy print, I can lend you the Annual Conference booklet which contains all the business items, reports, and all the information for the annual conference.

In this report I will briefly present the business items covered and how I voted on your behalf. Hard copies of this report are available in the library.

<u>Unfinished business 1: People of Color</u>

The committee presented a report on the recommendations for diversity and inclusion of people of color within the Church of the Brethren. Standing committee recommended that these recommendations and suggestions be adopted within each district and congregation as appropriate. I voted in favor of this recommendation.

<u>Unfinished business 2: Breaking down barriers</u> between denominational events

This was a study to look at ways for more people to attend Annual Conference and to reduce costs. The annual conference is losing money every year due to a lack of attendance. Several options were presented including having the Conference every two years; alternating between an online virtual and in-person conference; or hybrid model where smaller venues are used and more people attend virtually.

The study was approved and the options are being considered by the Missions and Ministry Board and Annual Conference Administrators. My recollection of the discussion among the delegates seemed to be in favor of having the conference alternate between in-person and virtual. I voted in favor.

<u>Unfinished Business 3: Request for a study by</u> <u>Annual Conference on calling of Denominational leadership</u>

The purpose of this study and the recommendations is to improve the fairness of calling potential leaders who may be passed over for a variety of reasons. Also to make adjustments in the required number of nominations presented to standing committee. For most positions, a minimum of four nominations are required but only two are selected for the ballot. To meet that requirement standing committee often has to search for additional nominations and then many of those never make the ballot. And it was suggested by many who came to the microphones that there is some bias towards who is selected to be on the ballots. I voted in favor of all the recommendations.

New business 1: Renewing the agency status of Bethany Theological Seminary

It was approved and I voted in favor.

New business 2: Renewing of Agency status of Eder Financial Services

The renewal was approved and I voted in favor.

New Business 3: Renewal of agency status for On Earth Peace

The renewal was approved. I did not vote in favor of approval.

New business 4: Reducing harm: interim steps to address suffering

This query essentially addressed outdated language in previous statements on human sexuality within the Church of the Brethren, primarily replacing the word homosexual with LGBTQ+.

The standing community acknowledges the concerns and recommendations, however, the language in the statements cannot be changed as they are a matter of record. So all that could be done is to acknowledge and confirm the concerns until a new statement is drafted and approved by Annual Conference with the updated language.

The query was approved and I voted in a favor.

New business 5: Concerns about current practices regarding matters of sexuality

This query was proposed to move the discussion forward on how the Church of the Brethren as a whole will address the division and discrepancies throughout the US on how matters of human sexuality are addressed, primarily the practice of officiating same sex marriages and installing LGBTQ+ pastors.

The query was approved. I voted not to approve as it was pointed out by Torin Eikler that this is essentially the same query that was brought forth last year and that we should pursue under that previous query.

New business 6: Recommendation cost of living adjustment to the ministerial cash salary table for pastors.

This was approved and I voted in favor.

I consider it a privilege to represent our church at Annual Conference and I am available to discuss any of this information individually.
