Summer Resilience & Rest

As we step into the warmth of July, our schedules often shift. Vacations, backyard barbecues, and lazy afternoons become the norm. In the busyness of the rest of the year, we can easily forget the importance of simply pausing.

In the Bible, the seventh month of the biblical calendar was often marked by feasts, trumpets, and a designated time to step back from daily labor. July, as the seventh month of our modern Gregorian calendar, offers us a similar invitation: a chance to embrace a holy pause.

Jesus often withdrew from the crowds to quiet places to pray and rest. In Mark 6:31, He tells His disciples, **"Come with me by yourselves to a quiet place and get some rest."** If the Son of God needed time to step away, recharge, and commune with the Father, how much more do we?

Often, we view our faith through the lens of productivity—what we are doing for the church, our families, and our community. But there is deep spiritual value in simply being rather than always doing. God designed us to need rest. Taking time to appreciate the beauty of creation, spend unhurried time in prayer, or enjoy fellowship with loved ones is a form of worship in itself.

As you navigate this summer month, I encourage you to embrace the slower, sacred rhythm of July:

Unplug: Take a few moments each week away from screens to be still.

Reflect: Spend time reading scripture outdoors or simply thanking God for His daily blessings.

Reconnect: Enjoy a meal and genuine conversation with family, friends, or a neighbor.



Rest isn't a reward we earn; it is a gift from God. Let us use this season to recharge our spirits, so we may return to our ministries and daily lives with renewed energy, grace, and joy.

For the month of July, a perfect verse is Psalm 29:11: **"The LORD gives strength to his people; the LORD blesses his people with peace."** It is an ideal reminder of resilience and rest during the warm summer days.



BLESSED IS THE NATION on Its 250th Birthday

We read in I Timothy 2:1-3 (NIV); I urge, then first of all, that requests, prayers, intercession and thanksgiving be made for everyone - for kings and all those in authority, that we may live peaceful and quiet lives in all godliness and holiness. This is good and pleases God our Savior.

In this text Paul encourages us to pray with thanksgiving for all those who exercise authority over us. I believe we need to pray for those at all levels of government who have been elected or appointed to govern us. We need to pray for our leaders at the national, state, and local level. We need to pray for them whether they are Democrats, Independents, or Republicans. But we also need to remember that the church, the bride of Christ, is international in scope. Some Christians find themselves living in democracies and others find themselves living in dictatorships. Nevertheless, Christians need to pray for those in authority over them. I lived for one year in a South American dictatorship in Argentina during 1969-1970. There were few political freedoms in Argentina at that time. Political protest could mean arrest, imprisonment, torture, or even death. However, Christians were praying that they could live quiet and peaceable lives. Finally, in 1983 democracy was restored to Argentina.

Americans can give thanks to the Lord for the economic, political, and religious freedoms that we enjoy under our form of government for the last 250 years. We can be grateful that our ancestors were allowed to enter this land. Although this continent contained only 16.2 % of the land area of this earth, geographers have estimated that in 1800 North America had over half of the world's coal reserves in addition to 25% of its iron ore and petroleum reserves. America also had the world's largest commercially usable forest reserves at that time. Perhaps most importantly, God endowed America with the largest and most productive area of unused agricultural land in the world. Even today America is still one of the few nations that can feed itself and export food to feed millions of hungry people around the globe.

I thank God that four of my Ukrainian great grandparents were able to escape starvation in Eastern Europe to come to America before World War I. I thank

God that my ancestors from Ireland were allowed to come to America before the American Civil War to enjoy better economic opportunities. Finally, I thank God that my predecessors from England, France, Germany, Holland, Switzerland, and Wales were able to flee religious persecution and come to colonial America to worship in a quiet and peaceful manner.

When you celebrate the Fourth of July this year, the 250th birthday of the United States of America, especially take time to pray for all of our political authorities and to thank God for the economic opportunities, political rights, and religious freedoms our civil authorities allow us to enjoy every day of the year. America has truly been blessed or set apart from most of the other nations found on this planet. For as Psalm 33:12 declares, ***Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord.***

GETTING STRONG MIGHT TAKE LESS TIME THAN YOU THINK

Building strength and muscle is important for an aging body, yet most Americans don't lift weights or practice muscle-strengthening exercises, according to NPR. While many say it's lack of time, exercise physiologists argue that even a minimum dose can help make meaningful progress. One physiologist, a professor at Memorial University of Newfoundland, reviewed studies on resistance training and found that a beginner could start with one 30-minute workout a week for the first three months and work their way up. Even doing the minimal amount can bring health benefits, as long as enough effort is put into the workout.
